TRUMP WANTS A VICTORY WITH NORTH KOREA BUT CAN'T GET OUT OF HIS OWN WAY

North Korea canceled a high-level meeting with South Korea this week complaining that the presence of strategic bombers during an annual U.S.-South Korea military exercise violated the Panmunjom Declaration signed last month by North and South Korea. The training exercise involving B-52s has now been scrapped (imagine the right-wing outrage machine had Obama done something like that).

Meanwhile, the North Koreans also balked at National Security Advisor John Bolton's claim that the U.S. seeks a "Libya-style" outcome from talks with North Korea; that is, that North Korea will completely dismantle the entirety of its nuclear program. (Notwithstanding the obvious difference that North Korea has a nuclear weapons arsenal and Libya only had an early-stage nuclear program.) Though the White House <u>distanced itself</u> from Bolton's claim, North Korea announced that the episode could cause it to pull out of the June 12 summit between Kim Jong Un and Donald Trump.

Trump addressed the matter this week, <u>seemingly confused</u> about just what the "Libya model" is.

"The Libya model is not a model we have at all with North Korea," Trump said, adding that Kim would "be there, running his country."

Of course Qaddafi was "there, running his country" too after he gave up his nuclear weapons program in 2003. Perhaps Trump was thinking of the U.S., British, and French-led military operation that led to Qaddafi's ouster and ultimate death in 2011. That model seems to be on the table, as Trump is now back to threatening military action to wipe out Kim if he doesn't get a



deal (<u>as is Sen. Lindsey Graham</u>). He even presented a strange offer <u>to protect</u> Kim Jong Un if he agrees to give up his nukes.

HASPEL'S CONFIRMATION CLOSES THE BOOKS ON TWO TRUMP NOMINEES THAT COULD HAVE BEEN DEFEATED

The Bush administration torture program is a black stain on our country's history. What's even worse is that the perpetrators of the program have not faced the slightest amount of accountability. And what's even worse than that, we once again learned this week that we are



apparently so unwilling to reckon with this dark past that we're okay with rewarding those who presided over it.

The U.S. Senate confirmed Gina Haspel yesterday to become Donald Trump's CIA Director. Haspel oversaw a CIA black site in Thailand after 9/11 where terror suspects were subjected to brutal torture, and she led a cover up of what she did there by helping to destroy video recordings of the interrogations. And despite Haspel's <u>refusal</u> to acknowledge that what she did was wrong, six Democrats joined all but three Republicans in approving her ascension to the top job at Langley.

THE SMALLEST OF SILVER LININGS

"Activists' prodding of Democrats to oppose Trump's nominees did have some impact," Politico noted in a fairly demoralizing after action report. "Only five of the 15 minority-caucus senators who supported Pompeo to lead the CIA last year backed him again to be secretary of state last month, and Haspel was confirmed with the lowest number of votes of any director in the spy agency's history."

TEAM TRUMP CELEBRATES IN JERUSALEM AS GAZA BLEEDS

Trump administration officials and family members celebrated the opening of the United States <u>Embassy in Jerusalem</u> on Monday as Israeli soldiers less than 50 miles away opened fire on unarmed Palestinian protesters in Gaza, reportedly killing dozens and injuring thousands including a victim as young as eight-months-old.

Not only is Trump's unilateral move of the U.S. Embassy to Jerusalem and "<u>blank check</u>" approach to Israel furthering senseless suffering and isolating the United States from the <u>international community</u>, but it has also furthered prospects for building a just peace to end the decades of military occupation and conflict in the Middle East.

KEY POINTS TO REMEMBER:



- Instead of embracing violence, systematic land confiscation and annexation, and permanent occupation, the Trump administration should invest in inclusive, robust, and sustained diplomacy that helps build a just and sustainable peace.
- The scenes of horrific bloodshed and suffering in Gaza were merely the latest in a long string of assaults against protestors and systematic deprivation of Palestinians' human rights, with nearly 2 million people in Gaza living "caged in a toxic slum from birth to death," as the United Nations human rights chief recently said.
- Israel has a right to defend itself but its <u>violations</u> of international law and its continued blockade on Gaza **do nothing for defense and preventing violence**, and only further human suffering in the "world's largest open-air prison."
- A strong, principled, U.S. foreign policy **should reflect our shared values** of <u>peace</u>, cooperation and commitment to the human rights, freedom and security of all people.

BURIED LEDES



<u>This</u> probably shouldn't be too surprising but **Trump apparently had no idea the U.S. was in talks with Europe on the Iran deal** when he made his decision to violate it, and he <u>never had</u> a senior-level debate about it.

The president of the European Council <u>had this to say</u> about Trump and his decision to violate the Iran deal: "with friends like that who needs enemies." (One observer <u>notes</u> that Putin "only dreamed" of such transatlantic rifts before Trump realized them.)

Meanwhile, the EU is <u>looking to invoke a regulation</u> from the 1990s <u>to protect</u> European companies doing business in Iran from U.S. sanctions, "**put[ting] itself on a collision course with the US** over Donald Trump's decision to withdraw from the nuclear deal with Iran."

Also, the New York Times <u>picked up on the fact</u> that **an influential Iran deal critic is trying to skirt responsibility** for the consequences of the agreement falling apart now that Trump has violated it.

Shiite Iraqi cleric Moqtada al-Sadr's <u>surprise showing</u> in Iraq's recent parliamentary elections "again demonstrate Iran's limited popular support in the country."

Sen. Jeff Merkely <u>announced</u> that he will soon <u>introduce legislation</u> that **seeks to rein in the executive branch's war powers**. The bill will be offered as a stronger alternative to a recent Corker-Kaine proposal for a new Authorization for Military Force that, <u>from our estimation</u>, will essentially give the president a blank check to wage war wherever and whenever he or she wants.

"We see in 2018 the humanitarian situation inside Syria being the worst we have seen since the war started," a UN official <u>said</u> this week.

The U.S. has spent \$2.3 trillion on counterterrorism since 2001. Feel safer?

Rep. Ro Khanna isn't backing down from <u>trying to limit</u> the U.S. role in Saudi Arabia's disastrous war in Yemen.

File <u>this</u> in the "This Would Probably Be a Huge Deal in Normal Times" folder: The Pentagon said **Special Forces were unprepared in deadly Niger ambush**.

Experts <u>say</u> it's probably not helpful that **most of Trump's foreign policy advisers are old white men**.
