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SL: Border Militarization, Weapons Sales, and Iran Snapback: 3 Stories You Might Have Missed

### The Takeaway:

- A recent DoD Inspector General's report found that the Trump administration did not break the law by sending U.S. troops to the southern border to terrorize migrants and asylum-seekers. But its legally dubious reasoning won't stop us from fighting to demilitarize the borders and ensure justice for all displaced people.
- The State Department may have fabricated a national security emergency in order to push through a weapons sale to Saudi Arabia, Jordan, and the UAE. Plus, following the announcement of the Israel-UAE deal, Trump wants to sell the latter killer drones and fighter jets. The arms manufacturers' hold on Washington is strong, but we will break it.
- Just as we predicted last week, the Trump administration lost the UN vote to extend an arms embargo on Iran, and is now trying to invoke snapback sanctions on Iran. We must resist Trump's hybrid war.

## 3 Stories You May Have Missed This Week

It's been a busy week! Whether you were watching the Democratic National Convention, following the NBA playoffs, or getting [arrested](#) on your friend's yacht by the US Postal Service, here are some top foreign policy stories that you may have missed.

### The DoD Whitewashes Trump's Border Militarization

In November 2018, Donald Trump authorized U.S. troops to use lethal force against migrants and asylum-seekers at the southern border. This was cruelty for cruelty's sake. It was also a dangerous abuse of power, potentially violating the Posse Comitatus Act's restrictions on the use of military resources for domestic law enforcement. Win Without War, leadership in Congress like [Rep. Raul Grijalva](#) (D-AZ) and communities across the progressive movement [fought back](#). After a year of relentless campaigning, the Office of the Inspector General of the Department of Defense (DoD) opened an investigation.

The results came out this week and they're [disappointing](#), filled with [dubious reasoning](#) in justification of the administration's misdeeds. The [report's](#) main flaw is that it seems to find that a DoD *policy directive* gave the authority to violate the Posse Comitatus Act's restrictions. The problem? Posse Comitatus can only be excepted by *statute* (i.e. not a directive). The law it does

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cite as providing statutory exception, the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act, does no such thing.

In short, the report whitewashes an abuse of power. But what could we expect when the president [sidelines](#) any Inspector General that doesn't fall in line? Despite the disappointment, the battle's not over. We'll keep fighting to [demilitarize](#) the border, to prevent even more abuses of power, and to build a country that treats those who arrive at its borders with humanity, solidarity, and compassion.

## Foreign Policy to the Highest Bidder

Last week, the Trump administration was [accused](#) of fabricating a national security "emergency" last year to justify Secretary of State Mike Pompeo's invocation of emergency authorities to sell \$8 billion in weapons to Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates (UAE), and Jordan. At the time of the arms sale, a State Department official claimed that the emergency occurred close to May 20, 2019. Yet a recent State Department Inspector General [report](#) found that Pompeo had started the emergency declaration process weeks prior. The report *also* [revealed](#) that civilian lives weren't even considered in the sale's decisionmaking process.

That's right: the State Department lied about our national security in order to bypass Congressional authority and justify lining the pockets of weapons manufacturers, all with no regard for the lives those weapons will take or their role in fueling the human-made humanitarian disaster in Yemen. On top of all this, less than a week after announcing a deal formalizing relations between Israel and the UAE, Trump and Kushner are [pushing](#) to sell F-35 fighter jets and killer drones to the latter. Yet again, U.S. foreign policymaking is decided by the pursuit of private profits for the war industry and kowtowing to supposed Gulf "allies."

But new legislation could help push back: Rep. Tom Malinowski's (D-NJ) [amendment](#) to the Fiscal Year 2021 State and Foreign Operations Appropriations Act would prohibit weapons sales to Saudi Arabia and the UAE for one year, buying more time for longer-term measures like Rep. Ilhan Omar's (D-MN) [Stop Arming Human Rights Abusers Act](#), or a recently-introduced bill to [block](#) the sale of drones.

## Our Snapback Predictions Come True

In last week's [Progressive Foreign Policy Debrief](#), we predicted that the UN would reject Trump's proposal to extend an arms embargo on Iran, which Trump would then use as pretext to call for "snapback" sanctions on Iran. Unfortunately, we were [right](#).

However, having unilaterally withdrawn from the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Actions (JCPOA), the United States likely has *no* legal justification to invoke its snapback measures, and the gambit will [hopefully](#) be rejected. But the administration's Hail Mary pass shouldn't be ignored: if snapback sanctions are pushed through, not only will the people of Iran be forced to suffer

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under even stricter suffocating restrictions, but the remaining framework of the JCPOA would also be critically undermined. We must resist Trump's hybrid [war](#) at every turn.

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## **BURIED LEDES**

**Mali's President Ibrahim Boubacar Keïta has resigned in the country's second military [coup](#) in a decade.** Mali's future remains uncertain, but one thing is clear: the country wasn't helped by the unrest unleashed from the disastrous NATO [intervention](#) in neighboring Libya.

**Russian opposition-leader Aleksei Navalny has been [hospitalised](#) as a result of a suspected poisoning.** But let's be clear: Putin's repeated crimes are no excuse for war mongering or "[Great Power Competition](#)."
